In **Los Angeles** "Reaching Today's Youth: Community Health Issues in the New Millennium," conference enhances HIV prevention, testing and treatment knowledge and skills among teachers, health care providers, community youth programs and domestic violence shelters. [November 14]

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• Outposted testing is available at numerous sites including, "Out of the Closet" thrift shops, benefiting from generosity of donations from Los Angeles' numerous celebrities (such as Elizabeth Taylor, Carol Burnett and Ellen DeGeneres) and film and television production companies. [December 1-9] In **Miami** an emotive educational play, "No Not Me, I'm Too Young," about a girl who was born with HIV and died from AIDS at age 16 is performed for an audience of 450 inner-city youth. [World AIDS Day, December 1, 5:00 P.M. at the Greater Bethel AME Church, 245 N.W. 8th Street, Miami.]

Miami sets its outreach program to music by collaborating with rap star Midnite to write and record "Gettin' Busy," a CD that will be played at local Miami churches, schools and community organizations. [December 1-9] New York organizes a landmark multidisciplinary conference for providers and youth, "Gettin' Busy: Youth and HIV," featuring a key note address by New York State Health Commissioner Antonia Novello, MD, DPH, designed to improve health care providers' understanding and implementation of voluntary HIV counseling, testing, treatment and prevention among their adolescent patients. [October 24]

A "Hittin' the Zip" squad consisting of a team of multigenerational men and women fans out through New York City neighborhoods to distribute "Get Tested!" materials and messages from posters and palm cards to condoms and the second annual issue of a teen zine called "The Deal." The team and med-

ical providers organize HIV testing at outposted testing sites including churches, libraries and community organizations. [November-December]



In **Washington**, **D.C.**, Children's National Medical Center hosts a training session for local high school newspaper journalists and kicks off a teen journalism contest, with the best health story on Project ACCESS receiving scholarship funds. [November 10]

Washington's New School Activists peer educators with urban flair—use poetry and Hip-Hop to promote and encourage healthier decision-making processes among youth through the recognition and utilization of their own creativity. [December 1, 11:00 A.M., at The George Washington University Campus—Marvin Center, 21st and H Streets NW, Washington, D.C.]

The **Baltimore** "Sex and Life 101," a youth-oriented theatre troupe musical, based on the musical "The Wiz," charts the characters along the yellow brick road to HIV testing. [World AIDS Day, December 1, 7:00–9:00 P.M., Dunbar High School, 1400 Orleans Street, Baltimore.]

• On-the-street health education targets four segments of the youth population, one week each to gay/lesbian youth, youth in the criminal justice system, teen parents, and college-age youth. [November]
